## **Pupil Premium Strategy Outcomes**

The impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2022 to 2023 academic year:

- In Reading, Writing and Maths disadvantaged pupils attained in line with our expected yearly progress.
   60% of PPG pupils achieved end of year expectations for Reading and Maths. Writing remains an area to develop and is a focus for the whole school for 2023-24.
- Wider curriculum data shows PPG pupils (without an identified SEND need) achieved in line with their peers
- Attendance for PPG pupils for 22-23 was 92.3%
- Pupil voice indicates that PPG pupils are happy to attend school and feel supported by staff.
- Negative incidents on the playground were minimal with pupils increasingly able to vocalise and identify their emotions.
- All pupils were able to access extra-curricular activities including trip to the theatre, residential activity
  experience, extra-curricular clubs.

#### **Statement of Intent**

Pupil Premium is a government grant which is allocated to schools based on the number of children eligible for free school meals and the number of children who are or have been looked after by the Local Authority, referred to as 'looked-after children'. Schools are entitled to spend their allocated Pupil Premium Grant in a way they think will best improve attainment and achievement for these children. At Mark Cross we are determined to give every child access to high quality teaching to enable them to reach their potential. For teachers to be able to give the most attention to the children in their care, we also believe that a high-quality teaching assistant in every class is also essential. This combination of high-quality teaching through a partnership in the classroom, has led to historically good national results at Mark Cross; a trend we wish to continue.

#### **Challenges**

We have identified the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils. Pupil Premium is used at Mark Cross to remove any barriers to learning which may exist. These include:

- 1. Supporting positive attitudes to learning and to raise self-esteem and positive social interactions.
- 2. Supporting pupils with emotional and mental well-being
- 3. Reducing any gaps in learning and progress which may occur (in relation to those not in receipt of Pupil Premium). The school has identified these gaps in the areas of speech and language, phonics, sport and reading.
- 4. Providing additional support to the Mark Cross Pupil Premium children who are also SEN, helping them to make accelerated progress.
- 5. Developing a curriculum which can be fully accessed by those children who are in receipt of Pupil Premium. By seeking opportunities for this group of children to make links in their learning, a greater level of engagement and progress can be attained.
